What sort of things would necessarily work against your objective? List them as rules:

Thou shalt not affect others negatively for personal gain

How it harms: Stealing, murder, lying, etc - no thought for greater good

Thou shalt not choose non-action over a potential helpful action.

How it harms: Allows laziness and bystander syndrome.

Thou shalt not act without consideration of greater good for effected groups

How it harms: Allows harmful acts of negligence even if not intentional

Briefly describe this society: Some objective external marker, i.e. a degree in a certain subject, is used to determine whether you can vote. These people's voting is left anonymous. The systems they enact are voted on by the people after 5 years. The voters most correlated with citizen satisfaction join a council when older that vets laws voted in.

How does this society incentivize or promote your core motivation?

It encourages people to educate themselves (or train themselves) in order to do what they want to do while helping others, it ensures societal decisions are in the interest of the people, and it ensures needs will be met because of private competition to meet them.

How might this society fail? Are there any destructive or harmful incentives?

Private competition can engender corruption - would need safeguards.

Educated voting can create racial or other biases - compensate in some way?

Giving people enough money to survive encourages laziness - passivity tax and don't give too much

Describe what someone's life might be like in your society:

Hi, my name's Will Foyar. I just turned 15 so I'm qualified for my living wage this year. It means I would have to move out of my parents house, but I think I might. There's a local robotics company that does some pretty cool stuff - I might apply for some training there. It's also better than getting myself through school on my own on a diet of ramen and root beer. My parents house isn't that much more appealing either; my dad does the minimum not to get hit with the passivity tax and my mom makes a little as a physical therapist but we don't have much more than our assigned living wage as a family. I was also thinking about getting for my politics and reasoning degree, but it seems pretty stressful and I don't know if I could make it to council.

Describe what your life might be like in your society:

The most critical work of any society is done out of the reach of the government. Government is akin to scientific research; it is necessary but the truly influential work happens with its application. I would go through education as long as I needed to obtain the skills I needed, learning some at other companies if I needed to, and use those skills to create a private engineering firm that would enact and work with. How might this society come about from the one we have today? governmental decisions. Revolution doesn't start in government, it ends there. It starts as an idea, which people must enamor themselves with, which then, finally, makes its way into the government. The idea would have to be presented, and the people ensnared in its promise. What would follow in government would be $\ln 3v1 + ab/3$.

How could you help make this happen?
